The Moscow Male Jewish Choir

Jewish liturgical music has always attracted special attention from listeners. This may be explained by the fact that this music, born in the beginning and middle of the 19th century in the countries of Eastern Europe and Western Russia, practically ceased to exist after the 1917 Revolution. Only in the second half of the 20th century has its restoration been started to any extent. Originality with an uncommon beauty and harmony is what lends intrigue to the resurgence of this music. In 1991, the Moscow Male Jewish Choir of the Academia of Cantonal Art was established with the assistance and support of JOINT (an American charitable Jewish organization) for performing and popularizing of a wide range of Jewish vocal music: folk songs, liturgical repertoire, modem Jewish and Israeli vocal and choral compositions. Renamed the "Hasidic Cappella" in 1998 to reflect the choir's evolution, its repertoire also contains compositions of world classics and songs of various nations of the world. The Choir seeks to revitalize the Jewish choral and vocal music arts, based upon the deep roots and ancient traditions, not only of Jewish, but also Russian professional choral performances.


